<u>Ch. 1 –</u> Societal Issue: Racism

<u>Quote 1:</u> "The idea is if we don't look out the white race will be --- will be utterly submerged. It's all scientific stuff; it's been proved" (Fitzgerald 17).

Commentary/Analysis: From the very first chapter of the novel the reader is introduced to the concept of white supremacy—at least from Tom's perspective. Tom is hinting at the fact that the white race is the dominant race, and they have to keep it that way, because if other races gain control, they'll make a mess of things since they are naturally inferior. Fitzgerald has subtly allowed the reader to see that Tom is a racist and further, that he is a racist who believes he is an intellectual individual, when in fact, he is acting blatantly ignorant.

<u>Ch. 2–</u> Societal Issue: Society and Class

<u>Quote 1:</u> "I like your dress," remarked Mrs. McKee, "I think it's adorable." Mrs. Wilson rejected the compliment by raising her eyebrow in disdain. "It's just a crazy old thing," she said. "I just slip it on sometimes when I don't care what I look like" (Fitzgerald 32).

Commentary/Analysis – Fitzgerals is eluding to the fact that Myrtle's persona drastically changes depending on her audience. Fitzgerald juxtaposes her character from when she is in the Valley of the Ashes with Wilson to her actions and mannerisms when she is at the apartment in the city. She states that her outfit is just an "crazy old thing" when in reality, the readers know that her outfit she is wearing at her party surely costs more than her entire closet in the Valley of the Ashes. Myrtle is thrilled to be in the city with Tom and living her "second life"—a ife much better than reality. The Wilson's social class is categorized as lower-middle class in the Valley of the Ashes whereas the lifestyle Mrs. Wilson leads when with Tom would pertain to an upper-class fashion of living. Society and class play a prominent role in the novel and the audience can see clearly that Myrtle's character changes depending on her surroundings. Her characteristics suggest she is a snobby, upperclass woman with a nonchalant attitude, and it would be below her to accept such a compliment.
